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client

customer

"Intend" is generally translated as "tener la intención de" or "planear hacer algo." It is used when someone has the intention of carrying out an action in the future.

'I intend to study for my exam tonight.' (Tengo la intención de estudiar para mi examen esta noche).

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pretend

"Pretend" is translated as "fingir" or "simular." It is used when someone acts or says something that is not real, with the intention of deceiving or making others believe something that is not true.

'He pretended to be a detective to solve the mystery.' (Él fingió ser un detective para resolver el misterio).

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actual

It refers to something that is real or existing in contrast to something that is potential or imaginary. It can describe real facts or situations. [real]

The actual cost of the project is higher than anticipated.

actually

It is used to correct or modify a previous statement. It can also introduce additional or surprising information, often in contrast to what is expected. [en realidad]

He thought the test was today, but actually, it's tomorrow.

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scream

It refers to a loud, high-pitched cry, often associated with intense emotions like fear, excitement, or pain. It's typically involuntary and tends to have a sharper tone.

She screamed when she saw the spider.

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shout

It involves raising one's voice loudly or energetically, often to be heard from a distance or to emphasize something. It can be more controlled than a scream and is used in various situations, such as giving orders or expressing strong emotions.

He shouted to get everyone's attention.

yell

It is similar to 'shout' in the sense of raising one's voice loudly, but it often implies a more strident tone or one of anger. It's used when expressing fury, anger, or frustration.

They yelled at each other during the argument.





find out

or

figure out

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find out

- It is used to indicate discovering information, facts, or the truth about something that wasn't previously known. It involves gaining knowledge or finding an answer.

'I want to find out where she went.'

figure out

- It is used to express the process of solving a problem or understanding something that might be complex or confusing. It refers more to comprehending or solving something through reasoning or logic.

'I need to figure out how to solve this puzzle.'



In summary...

- The confusion might arise because both expressions involve reaching some kind of understanding or knowledge, but 'find out' focuses more on uncovering information or facts, while 'figure out' focuses on problem-solving or understanding something. The direct translation to Spanish might seem similar (descubrir, averiguar), leading to the confusion between these two English expressions.
